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Grade 3 Book Project Choice Board

Students will need to choose two boxes to complete their novel readings. Each written project should be $\frac{3}{4}$ of a page or longer.

<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Book Cover</u></p> <p>Create a book cover for the book you read. Make sure it looks different from the actual book cover. On the front include the title, author, illustrator, and a picture. On the back include the setting, characters, genre, and a summary of the book.</p> <p>Materials Needed: drawing paper, markers, crayons</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Comic Strip</u></p> <p>Create a comic strip showing 5 major events from the book in sequence. Include captions and /or dialogue bubbles to retell the story along with pictures.</p> <p>Materials Needed: computer paper cut into strip, and, pencil, crayons</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Friendly Letter</u></p> <p>Write a one page to a friend recommending your book. Tell your friend what the book was about and why you would recommend it. Make sure you include the title, author, characters, and setting.</p> <p>OR</p> <p>Write a letter to one of the characters of the story. Talk to them about events that happen in the story. You can also ask them questions about events that happened.</p> <p>Materials Needed: paper/pencil / can be typed</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Poster Board</u></p> <p>Create a poster board trying to convince other students to read your book. In your advertisement you need to include the title, author, and summary. Remember you are trying to sell your book for others to read, be creative.</p> <p>Materials Needed: poster board, markers, crayons</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Story Mobil</u></p> <p>Create a mobile to go with your story. On the mobile you will need to include the title, author, setting, characters, beginning, middle, and end of the story. You and also add illustrations to the three parts of the story.</p> <p>Materials Needed: hangar, string, computer paper, pencil crayons</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Poem or Song</u></p> <p>Create a poem or song that summarizes the story. Include the title author, setting , characters and summary.</p> <p>Materials Needed: paper, pencil</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Mural</u></p> <p>Create a mural that represents your book. You can use graffiti drawing. You need to include title, picture of the characters, picture of the setting, and picture of the setting. A written explanation of the mural is also needed.</p> <p>Materials Needed: computer paper, crayons, chalk(spray mural with hair stray to set the chalk)</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Crossword Puzzle</u></p> <p>Using graph paper make a crossword puzzle with answers to questions from the book. Make sure to include the title, author , vocabulary words that are new to you, questions on the setting and plot. Also have an answer key written</p> <p>Materials Needed: graph paper, pencil</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Timeline</u></p> <p>Create a timeline of events that happen in the story. The events need to be in order that they occur in the book. They can be labeled by dates ,time or 1st, 2nd, 3rd,(etc).Include title, author, characters, setting and summary.(May include illustrations)</p> <p>Materials Needed: computer paper, cut into strips, pencil, crayons</p>

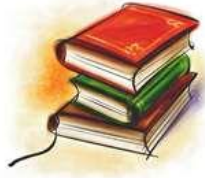
Character	Setting	Summary
Make a <i>book jacket</i> with pictures/names of the main characters. Include the title, author, and illustrator of the book.	Draw a <i>picture</i> (on poster board) illustrating a scene in the book. Include at least 7 important details, and label each of them.	Create a <i>timeline</i> of at least 7 events (small picture and description), in the order in which they occurred in the book.
Keep a daily <i>diary</i> for one of the characters for a 7-day period. Write at least 3 sentences each day.	Make a <i>diorama</i> of a setting in the book. Include at least 7 important details, and label each of them.	Make a 4-picture <i>comic strip</i> telling the story of the book on 8" X 14" paper. Include captions for each picture.
Do a comparison of two main characters on a <i>Venn diagram</i> , with at least 5 character traits in each section.	Draw 3 <i>scenes</i> from the book on an 8" X 14" paper. Include captions for each.	Create a 4-verse/ <i>stanza poem or song</i> that summarizes the story. Include the title, author, setting, and characters.
<i>Write</i> at least 3 paragraphs about which character you connect to the most and why.	Create a <i>bookmark</i> with a picture of a book setting on one side of it and a detailed description of the setting on the other.	Write a <i>letter</i> to a friend (at least 3 paragraphs) recommending the book. Include the five parts of a letter.
Make a <i>puppet and write a biography</i> (at least 2 paragraphs) for one of the main characters.	Make a <i>mobile</i> showing 4 drawn or printed settings from the story. Write a caption for each setting.	Create a poster board <i>advertisement</i> of the book. Include the title, author, characters, and summary of the book.
<i>Write</i> at least 3 paragraphs about what would happen if a main character had made a different decision.	Make a <i>book jacket</i> with a picture of a setting in the book. Include the title, author, illustrator, and a description of the setting.	Pretend to be a salesperson and " <i>sell</i> " the book by writing/reading at least 3 paragraphs summarizing the book.

13. Create a bookmark—include a book recommendation and key events
14. Write a letter to the author

17. Read two short stories—compare and contrast
