
From Ms. Denny:

Here is a summary of the October SEL lessons:

Preschool

In October, we talked about friendship and read the book, "How Do Dinosaurs Play with Their Friends?" The kids loved the book and pointed out the ways in which the dinosaurs were not playing nicely in the beginning. We talked about how we play with our friends inside and outside the classroom.

Pre-K

In October, pre-k learned about expected and unexpected behavior. Expected behavior is the behavior that is normal, reasonable and anticipated. Unexpected behavior is behavior that is out of the norm and is unusual. This way of talking about behavior is different from how it is normally discussed, in that it doesn't address behavior as simply "positive" or "negative" since what is expected can vary from situation to situation. For example, it is expected to use walking feet in the hallway and classroom, but not outside at recess or in the gym for PE. Another example, it is expected to raise your hand to answer a question or share something, but not at home. We used a social story about what expected and unexpected behaviors are to help facilitate a discussion about different areas of the school and using scenarios to determine if a behavior is expected or unexpected.

Kdg-5th Grade

We continue to work on becoming Social Detectives and in October we talked "My Smarts, Your Smarts." We talked about how we are all wired differently and we each have our own likes and dislikes, strengths and challenges. We have smarts in many different areas. Some people have smarts in academic areas like writing, reading, math, etc. Some people have physical smarts if they play a sport. We have smarts around our interests and hobbies, and of course, we have social smarts. Understanding this is the foundation of our self-awareness.

Junior High

The October Virtue was Friendship so in junior high we also talked about Friendship. Junior high students discussed what it means to be a friend, what friendship looks like, and what the difference is between being friendly and a friend. It was a great opportunity for discussion and questions.
